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

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Traditionally September was the month for the beginning of a new school year and thus was seen as the beginning of new programing for churches as well, like a new Sunday School year, more church activities and functions. For better or for worse, not all traditions continue as they began and as we were taught at the Seminary, be careful what traditions you start

because you never know where they will end (I would remind you of the story of the mother who always cut off the ends of the ham, but never new why).

September brings our annual celebration of Labor Day. According to the internet (and as we know, if it is on the internet it has to be true ③); "Labor Day is a federal holiday in the United States celebrated on the first Monday in September to honor and recognize the American labor movement and the works and contributions of laborers to the development and achievements of the United States. The three-day weekend it falls on is called Labor Day Weekend." Although this explanation for our celebration of Labor Day was and is a good reason to celebrate, like many traditions and celebrations it seems over time the reason to celebrate has been forgotten and instead it simply becomes a day to miss work and gather in revelry (which kind of counters the meaning of the holiday). Unfortunately, this lack of understanding many of our holidays exists today. Too few people even know or care for the reasons we celebrate the days we call holidays and simply find them to be days for party and revelry.

Perhaps you have noticed or perhaps not, but I usually list the Holy Days and Holidays of each month, noting especially those of church interest. This month we celebrate Holy Cross Day commemorating the cross of Christ on which He died to pay for our sins; St. Matthew, Apostle and Evangelists, bringing to mind the work of the Apostle Matthew, the tax collector turned disciples who gave us the Gospel of Matthew, and St. Michael and All Angels, or as some call it Michaelmas celebrating the three archangels, Angel Michael, Angel Gabriel, and Angel Raphael and the work God sent them to do at various time and in various places. I believe it would do us well to learn about, know and understand why we celebrate what we celebrate so that when we are asked we are better able to give an answer, not only for our celebrating, but also, more importantly for our faith and hope in Christ alone.

The Lutheran Way - It Makes A Difference? ~ (Building and Liturgy, part 3)

Following our hearing of the Gospel, our confessing our faith, our response of faith through our first fruits giving and



the offering of our petitions to the Lord we move into the Service of the Sacrament, the Lord's Supper. Usually during the singing of the Offertory or a choral response, the pastor(s) prepare the Altar bringing the elements from the Credence Table to the Altar in preparation for consecration. The *Service of the Sacrament* begins with Scriptural response between pastor and congregation. It includes the *Preface* for the Supper, as well as, the singing of the *Sanctus* in which we are reminded we will be communing at the altar with all the saints in heaven, the heavenly host (sabbaoth). We understand we cannot see them nor can they see us, but we have the assurance they are with us. Indeed, what joy to know it is at this time and place we can be as close as we can while on this earth with our loved ones who have passed on into the Church Triumphant. After we have prayed the very prayer our Lord has given us to pray, the *Lord's Prayer* (and certainly who can give a better prayer for us to pray than our Lord Himself?), the elements, bread and wine, are consecrated with the *Words of Institution* that as we are

given the bread, we are given the body of Christ Himself. And as we are given the wine, we are given the blood of Christ Himself as well.

As the congregants come forward and are invited to the table and kneel, they are given the body and blood of Christ as He tells us, "Take eat this is my body, my blood." Although there is nothing commanded in our being given the body and blood of our Lord, it is quite appropriate we are given His body directly in our mouths so that there is no part we have in being given His body. And it is most appropriate we partake of His blood from the common chalice as there is One Body of Christ, the Holy Christian Church, the Communion of Saints. It is also appropriate we affirm what we are given with the confident word of "Amen."

Here again our church building expresses the importance and centrality of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper as the Altar is in the middle of the chancel reminding us and teaching us that Jesus comes to us through His Holy Supper. As we are taught, so we practice what we believe, teach and confess about what and how Jesus gives us His gifts.

Following our dismissal from the Lord's Table and following the elements being properly put away, we continue singing the *Post-Communion Canticle*. Most appropriate is Simeon's song as it rejoices in the fact that now as we have seen Jesus in the flesh in His body and blood and tasting He is good, we are ready to meet our Lord, that is, we are ready to pass on from this world, the Church Militant to the Church Triumphant, and what joy that would be at that very moment.

Our Divine Service concludes with the Aaronic *Benediction* being placed on us. The three-fold, Trinitarian benediction again reminds us of our Baptism and prepares us to go out into the mission field where the fields are white with the harvest. Having been fed with the Word and Sacrament as we have been taught and having learned what we believe by the way we practice what we have been taught, we are strengthened in our faith and are able to go out and be ready to give an answer, a defense of the hope we have in Jesus and Jesus alone.

From the very beginning of our walking into our church building, we are being taught the importance of Jesus, His Word, Holy Baptism, Holy Absolution, the Word read and proclaimed, and His Holy Supper. At the same time we have seen how these important elements are in the Divine Service, that is, in God coming to us to give us the gifts and blessings He has to give: faith, forgiveness of sins, strengthening of faith, life (in this world and in the world to come), and salvation. We see clearly how what we believe informs how we carry out what we believe and how we rehearse what we believe teaches us the same.

Next, what are we missing or are we missing anything? Are we missing anything which might distract us from our being where we are? What else is there which might make a difference?




4TH FRIDAYS!!!!



Sunday School for All Ages


Preschool - Elementary Classes begin at 8:45 am in Room #5. The children are learning Biblical accounts from the Growing in Christ series.

~ A Message from Pastor Mendez~

Title: Reviving Faith Amidst Doubt and Uncertainty

In a rapidly changing world, a concerning trend has emerged: the decline in church attendance. As a pastor, I've noticed a growing lack of familiarity with the Word of God among many individuals in their daily lives. This lack of connection is especially prominent in a society saturated with both, information and misinformation, along with the pervasive consequence of sin. I have come to understand and address some of the reasons behind this decline and how, as believers, we can steer towards transformative change.

The Gap in Church Attendance

In an age where technology and distractions are ubiquitous, it is essential to examine why many people have lost the desire to attend church. One of the key challenges is the disconnect between God's Word and everyday life. At times, the church can be perceived as a place of judgment and condemnation, thus moving away from the essence of the gospel: but all this has been the cause of much lack of information between people, governments, social media and individuals, and the consequence of sin, and of the transforming grace of God. The lack of understanding between the law and the gospel, as well as between the cause of sin and the grace of God, can leave people disoriented and distant from the community of faith, which is what has lately been shown towards the Society? What have we as a Church shown to people from the outside? a Hatred of Society a Rejection of its Ideology? or rather an empathy in them not, to say that we approve everything that the Society is doing or "renewing" if we could call it like that, but we Know is because of The Sin in the World, but rather in an empathic way towards them for their lack of knowledge before the Absolute Truth that we can find in Sacred Scripture, and thus be able to lead them with love and patience towards a Transforming truth of the Knowledge of Sin, but in turn of Christ forgiving Love for All Humanity and His Sacrifice on the Cross to forgive us. Are We Doing It Right? Or are we doing it wrong?

A Transformative Approach

As believers, it is our responsibility to share the message of hope and love that Christ brought to the world. Our calling is to embrace God's Word—acknowledging the interplay between the law (sins consequence) and the gospel (God's transforming grace for all humanity). This will lead them to recognize that while the law condemns us, it also reveals our need for a Savior. We must be agents of change, redefining the church as a place of acceptance, healing, forgiveness, and patience, to facilitate spiritual growth in alignment with the Word of God and doctrine.

Motivating Society to Reconnect with God

To draw people back to the church and, more importantly, into a personal relationship with God, we should:

- 1. <u>Live the Gospel</u>: Our lives must reflect Christ grace and love in all areas, becoming authentic examples of the transformation God can achieve within them.
- 2. <u>Teach with Clarity</u>: As Christians, we should present the Word of God clearly and relevantly, helping people see its application in their daily lives. This will guide them to a transformative change through the Word and faith in Christ, having the opportunity to be faithful and fruitful agents of change of disciples of Christ who transform lives through their example and the Word of God.
- 3. <u>Create Community</u>: The church should be a community of faith in Christ, making people feel accepted and loved by a Christian community. This can help dispel the stereotypes that have marked the Church as intolerant due to societys lack of understanding of the Word of God.
- 4. <u>Serve the World</u>: Inspired by divine grace, we should actively engage in service to the needy, demonstrating God's love through our actions.
- 5. <u>Cultivate Faith Practically</u>: Encourage prayer and personal Bible study to strengthen individual relationships with God, preparing them to respond wisely to a society that has been misinformed and unfortunately harbors resentment and intolerance towards the Church. Let us be an example of Christ light to a society living in darkness, with love, prudence, and care, but above all, with patience and Love, just as God is patient with His children.

The decline in church attendance presents a challenge that demands transformative response. As believers, we must carry the light in a world filled with uncertainty and despair. By merging deep comprehension of the law and the gospel with a genuine concern for peoples well-being, we can motivate society to reconnect with God and experience the spiritual transformation that only the Lord can provide in His Word and Sacraments. Along this path, we recall Christ words: In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good work and give glory to your Father who is in heaven. (Matthew 5:16).
