Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As we come to the close of another Church Year's readings, the new Church Year beginning the last Sunday in November (27) remind us of the temporariness of our world and our time here on this earth. From Genesis One we learn that the very first thing God created was time. Because God is eternal and outside of time, He created time for us. In the beginning God created light, and He

separated the light from the darkness. And the light He called day, and the darkness He called night. We are told there was evening and morning, the very first day (Gen. 1:3-5), a twenty-four hour day for those of us He would create on the sixth day so that we would have time for work, play and rest. We can be assured that the day God created was a twenty-four hour day because it was not until the fourth day that God created the Sun, the moon, the stars and the planets, and He put them into the time-frame He created on the first day, that is a twenty-four hour time cycle (Gen. 1:14-19).

God's love can also be seen in the fact that our Galaxy and our Earth are the center of His creation, and our earth is the only planet in the universe which is capable of sustaining life, the life God created on the other days of creation including plants, animals and humans (Gen. 1:20-28). What a great loving God we have!

Of course, when God created the world, He already knew what was going to happen. Adam and Eve would sin, God would have to step in, that is He would have to enter His creation as a human in order to reconcile the sin of His creation, and yet His love is seen in that He created the world and us anyway (Gen. 3:15).

God's creation was intended from the beginning to be an eternal creation, but with sin and the curse, that perfect creation now would experience a time of termination at least in the cursed earthly realm. Thanks be to God that His desire to give us an eternal life did not cease. Thus, although our lives in this world are temporary and are actually very short, the blink of an eye, our real life in heaven is forever, and ever, without end, living with God in His eternal presence.

Thus, as we approach the end of our Church Year we are reminded once again of the temporariness of our time in this world and that the most important part of our lives in this world is being prepared for our time in heaven. The reading we hear are readings which remind us of the importance of always being ready to meet the Lord because it will happen, either at His return or at our own passing. Either way we will meet the Lord and that moment will be sooner than we know and sooner than we might imagine. So we are encouraged to take our eyes off the mundane and unimportant things of this world, while certainly not neglecting what we need to do while living in this world, but most importantly we are to fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and creator of our faith (Heb. 12:2). In other words, we are encourage to not spend so much time being about the business of this world, which most of our time is just busyness, and instead spend our time being about the Lord's business, being in Divine Service and Bible class, reading God's Word and having personal and family devotions, and always being ready to give an answer for the hope that we having in Jesus (1 Pet. 3:15).

Church Planting, the Confessional Lutheran Way

Last month in September the Texas Confessional Lutherans met for our Free Conference which is offered every year the second Friday and Saturday of September at Grace Lutheran Church, Brenham, TX. This year our conference theme was Church Planting. The purpose for the conference this year was to expose the misdirection and non-theological moorings of some church plants which are happening and to give a solid confessional doctrinal pining for church planting.

Back in the 1980s the Lutheran Church and the Texas District bought into the Chuck and Win Arn Institute for American Church Growth program which was not taken from any Biblical perspective or doctrinal stance, but came from a sociological understanding of how to grow a church. Unfortunately, because of the lack of any theological or doctrinal underpinnings, what was grown was a social club. The main problem with the "church growth" movement was that it intended to grow a church without using the means with which God has given His Church to grow, the Means of Grace. Although the Word was included in the Arn program the Sacraments (Holy Baptism, Holy Absolution and the Holy Supper) were excluded because they are not agreed upon by all denominations. The new means of grace was people. The rule of the movement was "build it and they will come" or "give the people what they want, their felt needs." Thus, the importance of Confession and Absolution were set aside for one's own feelings and emotions.

As of recent times, a new movement referred to as "missional" or "glocal" and "church planting" has as its underpinnings a business model, again with no regard for theology or doctrine. There are those who would also espouse the APEST (Apostles, Prophets, Evangelists, Shepherds (Pastors), Teachers) model attempting to initiate new offices into the Church, other than the one Office of Holy Ministry. In these models the pastors are seen as the ones who get in the way of growing the church.

From doctrine to practice (mamma always said, "practice what you preach") a Confessional Lutheran approach to church planting consists of Colonizing or Pioneering. Colonizing starts with a local congregation sending a group of people to begin a new congregation. Pioneering starts from scratch and is usually at a further distance from the providing congregation.

Here at St. Matthew we have a more unique opportunity, that of a Cross-Cultural planting. There are three options with such an opportunity.

1. Nesting, when two or more ethnic congregations share a facility. One owns the other nests.

2. Umbrella, the multiethnic church is similar to the "nesting" plant except the pastoral leadership and administration duties are housed under one umbrella.

3. Multiethnic, one church represented by those in which the various ethnicities are a part of every aspect of the congregation.

When we called Pastor Mendez as our Associate Pastor for Hispanic Ministries, we were not completely sure of what direction we needed to go, but we knew we had an opportunity here in this place to spread the Gospel to those who may not have heard the Good News. After several years, after several English as Second Language (ESL) classes, and after surviving a pandemic, we believe we now know the direction we should take. Pastor Bogs and Pastor Mendez, in consultation with the elders, believe we should pursue the nesting approach, that is, working to bring in those who have been through the ESL classes, as well, as Adult Instruction in the teachings of the Lutheran Church, into our congregation by beginning with a Spanish Service, until as such time they may be fully integrated into our English Service.

Is this the best approach? Is there a better approach? What might be the result? We do not know. Just as we did not know which was best at the start but began in faith to do something, so now we believe it is time to continue moving forward doing whatever we can to be about the business God has put us here to do, spreading the Good News of salvation for all who believe. We will do the seed planting and watering, and God will give the harvest. As we continue to reach out to the community sharing the Gospel, please keep the endeavor in your prayers so that God's Church may grow according to His will and be encouraged to be an active part of this incredible mission of St. Matthew.
